

ABOUT THIS REPORT

Per Arizona Revised Statutes §15-1655, the Arizona Board of Regents prepares an annual report of the Arizona Teachers Academy. Included in this report is information on student enrollment and completion in the academy. Each institution provided their own narrative.

ABOUT THE ARIZONA BOARD OF REGENTS

The Arizona Board of Regents is committed to ensuring access for qualified residents of Arizona to undergraduate and graduate institutions; promoting the discovery, application, and dissemination of new knowledge; extending the benefits of university activities to Arizona's citizens outside the university; and maximizing the benefits derived from the state's investment in education.

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ABOUT THE ACADEMY

The Arizona Teachers Academy (Academy) offers a year-for-year tuition and fees scholarship for students who commit to teach in Arizona public schools. Each of the three public universities, Rio Salado Community College, Scottsdale Community College and Pima Community College, operates a unique Academy allowing the enterprise to offer undergraduate and graduate students in rural and urban settings an opportunity to earn their teaching degree tuition free. Program graduates have a one-year grace period to begin teaching after completion and graduates are tracked to determine whether they have met the teaching obligation in their student agreement.

In addition to scholarships, students enrolled in the Academy have access to support services during and after completion of their program of study. These services are provided by the university and community college in partnership with school districts and include new teacher induction and mentoring to improve outcomes and retention.

Changes made to State statute in recent years has expanded programs offered to both students and existing teachers. Teachers interested in teaching dual enrollment courses can receive funding from the Academy to pursue the additional credit hours required by the Higher Learning Commission. Students that complete a degree or certificate program are also provided funding for the Arizona Department of Education Certification application and certification exams.

Academy funding for various programs are allocated and approved per Arizona Board of Regents Policy 2-325 annually.



FISCAL YEAR 2022

The fifth year of the Academy brought the largest enrollment at 3,310 students who benefitted from \$22.7 million in scholarships with average scholarships of \$7,100. The Academy funded 750 teachers for Induction Services. In FY 2022, Academy expenditures totaled \$24.7 million and the Arizona Teachers Academy Fund had an ending balance of \$8.9 million.

ACADEMY PROGRAMS

ARIZONA STATE UNIVERSITY

The Academy at ASU offers bachelor's degree, master's degree and non-degree certification programs. Students in these programs can major in early childhood, elementary, physical, secondary, special education or arts education within the Mary Lou Fulton Teachers College, or any other degree at ASU if the student chooses to seek alternative teacher certification.

The Academy engages Mary Lou Fulton Teachers College graduates as educator professionals to meet the challenges of teaching in Arizona PreK-12 schools. They strive to offer an authentic learning experience for participants by providing personalized coaching, collaborative communities and educational resources to support successful teaching in Arizona classrooms. Induction supports focused on topics of interest and critical topics in education to increase the ability of new teachers to respond appropriately to student needs.

NORTHERN ARIZONA UNIVERSITY

The Arizona Teachers Academy at NAU offers bachelor's degrees and master's degrees with certification at NAU Flagstaff, NAU statewide locations, and NAU online. These delivery options include traditional bachelor's programs beginning with freshman students as well as transfer programs in partnership with community colleges and Grow Your Own programs in local communities to meet critical shortage areas in special education, elementary education, and secondary education science fields identified by school districts. Graduate programs serve individuals who are seeking a second certification, enhanced content knowledge to teach dual enrollment college courses for high school students, or re-careering to the teaching profession. The Arizona Teacher Residency program offers a first-of-its-kind graduate program in Arizona, modeled after medical residencies, to help recruit, prepare, support, and retain K-12 teachers. Induction and mentoring support for enhancing retention of new teachers is provided during their first year in the classroom for graduates of the Arizona Teachers Academy at NAU.

UNIVERSITY OF ARIZONA

The Academy at the University of Arizona currently supports students in nearly twenty teacher certification programs, including those specializing in mathematics, special education, indigenous teacher education, agricultural education, and the fine arts. The Academy @ UArizona has also extended funding to students attending statewide programs like Pathways to Teaching, the Alternative Path in Education, Teach Arizona, and Deaf and Hard of Hearing.

Once Academy alumni begin their first year of post-graduation teaching, they are invited to participate in the university's New Teacher Program through which they can access a range of supports — from professional learning opportunities to one-on-one coaching to networking events. These supports are designed to not only accommodate new teachers' schedules, they also help establish valuable communities of practice while reinforcing evidence-based practices foundational to classroom instruction.

The university continues to grow the Academy as (a) the Pathways to Teaching program expands into more school districts across the state; and (b) the College of Education focuses on greater support for transfer and first-generation college students entering its certification programs.

MARICOPA COUNTY COMMUNITY COLLEGES

The Arizona Teachers Academies at Maricopa County Community Colleges (MCCCD) Rio Salado and Scottsdale Community Colleges offer post-baccalaureate certification programs. Rio Salado College offers certification programs in Early Childhood Education, Arts Education, Elementary, Secondary and Special Education. Scottsdale Community College offers an Elementary certification program. All certification programs are offered in a hybrid setting with real world teaching experiences throughout Maricopa County and Arizona. Teacher candidates have the choice of two options, Alternative and Traditional Pathways. The Alternative Pathway is for teacher candidates who are working as the teacher of record in a preK-12 classroom but need to complete Arizona state teaching certification and students complete in one to two years. The Traditional Pathway is for teacher candidates interested in teaching who complete a 12-week student teaching capstone. This model provides individuals an excellent opportunity for content experts and professionals to recareer into teaching with a strong base of knowledge in such areas as science, technology, engineering and mathematics, among others to the benefit of K-12 classrooms across Arizona.

The programs are designed for working adults and provide extensive mentoring support in the preK-12 classroom environment in addition to credit-bearing certification coursework.

Maricopa's post-baccalaureate certification programs are Arizona State Board approved and programs are offered at affordable tuition rates.

PIMA COMMUNITY COLLEGE

The Arizona Teachers Academy at the Pima Community College offers post-baccalaureate certification programs in Elementary, Secondary or Special Education. All three certificates offer online didactic instruction with real world teaching experiences throughout Pima County and Arizona. Students have the choice of two options, Alternative Pathway and Traditional Student Teaching. The Alternative Pathway is for those teachers who are working in a school district but need to complete Arizona State Certification with most students completing in about two years while they are working. The Traditional Pathway is for people interested in teaching but not currently working with a school district, the program supports the student in student teaching placement and because teaching is a high demand occupation, many who graduate obtain employment at one of their student teaching experiences.

The program is designed for people who are working and provides extensive mentoring support in addition to the didactic and student teaching experiences. Students must hold a bachelor degree or higher, be admitted into one of the Post-baccalaureate teacher preparation certificates, and complete a competitive application.

NATIONAL BOARD CERTIFICATION-ARIZONA K12 CENTER

Administered by the National Board for Professional Teaching Standards (NBPTS), National Board Certification is a rigorous and reflective process that requires teachers to showcase the National Board Standards and student learning in their practice. The process of certification is comprised of four components including a content area test and three portfolio entries designed to highlight differentiation in instruction, teaching practice and learning environment, and the effectiveness and reflectiveness of the practitioner. It is the highest credential a teacher can earn; the "gold standard" of accomplished teaching. Arizona currently has 1,637 National Board Certified Teachers, ranking 18th nationally.

The Arizona K12 Center has been providing support to teachers seeking this advanced credential for over 15 years. With the additional funding through the Arizona Teachers Academy, the Center has been able to expand its support through a myriad of candidate support activities as well as paying fees in full.

National Board Certification can take anywhere from 1-3 years, with an additional two years for teachers who are unsuccessful on their initial attempt to retake portions. The Arizona K12 Center remains committed to all candidates for National Board Certification as they move throughout the process as they want to see an accomplished teacher in every Arizona classroom.
